Verda Freeman Welcome was a force to be reckoned with. She was an American teacher, civil rights leader, and Maryland state senator. Ms. Welcome was the first black woman to be elected to a state senate. She spent 25 years in the Maryland legislature and worked to pass legislation which enforced stricter employment regulations and discouraged racial discrimination. She was also a powerhouse resident of the Greater Mondawmin area.

Ms. Welcome was elected to the Maryland House of Delegates in 1958 to represent the Fourth District of Baltimore City, becoming the first black woman in the position, which she held for three years. The force grew stronger and she was then elected to the Maryland State Senate in 1962, she had become the first black woman in the United States to be elected to hold a state senate seat. In April 1964, Welcome survived an assassination attempt; two men were convicted. Welcome worked towards eliminating Maryland's racial segregation laws in 1962 which had been in place since slavery was legal.

Welcome was a delegate to the Democratic National Convention in 1968, 1972, and 1976. She served in political office until 1982, when she retired. Welcome died April 22, 1990 in Baltimore. Welcome was awarded a Woman of the Year award in 1962, which was presented by the Women's Auxiliary to the National Medical Association. In 1988, she was inducted into the Maryland Women's Hall of Fame.

In March, Morgan State University and the Maryland Commission on African American History and Culture will have a special ceremony commemorating the life and legacy of Morgan alumna, the honorable Verda Freeman Welcome.

HBCU 'Equality Lawsuit'



According to a recent publication of the Afro American, students and administrators of Maryland's HBCU institutions are engaged in a court battle with the State of Maryland. This litigation is in regard to segregation. Can you imagine that in 2017, well according to records it is happening? "This case is about bringing long overdue racial equality to students enrolled at HBCUs and for the prospective students not yet enrolled in those schools who are seeking access to equal educational opportunity" said Kristen Clarke, president and executive director of the Lawyers committee for Civil Rights Under Law, Jan. 4th. The case has been heard since Jan.9th.

A number of public meetings are also being heard. The case is currently being held at the Garmatz Federal court. For those interested in this higher education process, please follow the Afro American newspaper for updates.




