Keion Carpenter

It is with great sadness that GMCC has to announce the passing of Mr. Keion Carpenter.

Mr. Carpenter was a native Baltimorean who never forgot his roots.

Keion Eric Carpenter (October 31, 1977 – December 29, 2016) was an American football defensive back. He played for the Buffalo Bills and the Atlanta Falcons of the National Football League.

He was the founder of The Carpenter House, Inc., a non-profit which specialized in consulting under-privileged families with home ownership. He was also a part of GMCC family.

Mr. Keion Carpenter was the distinguished master of ceremonies at the GMCC Men of Valor awards in 2015. He was the founder of the Carpenter House – nonprofit which taught carpenter skills to those interested in learning this skill which would empower their life. He also founded the Shutdown Academy – nonprofit which mentored young people through football, mentoring and life skills.

Mr. Carpenter was a champion to those he served and Baltimore City – he will be sorely missed.

Mr. Carpenter leaves to mourn his devoted wife and four children – three daughters and one son.

Mondawmin Neighborhood Improvement Association—bordered by Liberty Heights Ave, Auchentoroly Terrace, Fulton Avenue and Reisterstown Road. MNIA boundaries include both sides of Gwynns Falls Parkway, Reisterstown Road to Ruskin and the 2200 blocks of Whittier, Bryant and Orem Avenues.

The Parkway Community Association—boundaries are Tioga Parkway, Leighton, Fairview and Burleith Avenues, West Forest Park and a portion of Liberty Heights Avenue (opposite the Seven-Eleven store up to Burleith).

Greater Mondawmin Affiliate Neighborhood Associations (con't)

The Liberty Square Community Association—boundaries include the Reisterstown Road corridor from Park Circle to the intersection with Liberty Heights Avenue across from Mondawmin Mall.

The New Auchentoroly Terrace Association historic boundaries are comprised of the 3400-2700 blocks of Auchentoroly Terrace and 2300 blocks of Bryant Avenue, Whittier Avenue, Orem Avenue, Ruskin Avenue, Edgemont Avenue, Avalon Avenue, Fulton Avenue and 2700-2900 blocks of Parkwood Avenue.

The Robert W. Coleman Community Organization (RWCCO)- boundaries Windsor Avenue on the north, North Avenue on the south, Pulaski Street on the east and Warwick Avenue on the west.

The Fulton Heights Community Association-boundaries Payson Street to Fulton Avenue and North Avenue to Windsor Avenue.

Panway Neighborhood Improvement Association—boundaries 2300 block of Poplar Grove on the west to Evergreen Street on the east, then south from Gwynns Falls Parkway to North Avenue.

The Whittier-Monroe Community Neighborhood Association boundaries are north to Gwynns Falls Parkway – south to Windsor Avenue – east to Reisterstown Road and west to Pulaski Street. Community meetings are held the 3rd Tuesday of the month at the New Shiloh Village Senior Living – Community Room @ 1901 Elgin Avenue. Meetings are not held during July and August,



Vice President Brenda Simmons opened the meeting and Chaplain Deacon Tally Murray, Jr. lead us in an opening prayer; Recording Secretary Vivian Comer read the November 10th minutes which were approved as read.

Agenda:

Environmental Control Board – Natasha Neale, Community Program Liaison shared information in reference to the ECB's adjudication of citations issued by other City agencies. Information was provided for making payments and attending hearings to contest citations.

Baltimore Housing-Assistant Superintendent, Timothy Randolph- Northwest Office, spoke about the primary role of his office: code enforcement for the purpose of ensuring properties are maintained or cited for failing to be so and shared a handout “Keep Your Community Clean”.

Update on 3400 Auchentoroly Terrace at Gwynns Falls Pkwy by Dan Midvidy. Provided residents with most recent updates: received the approved building permit December 1st that is good for one year; hopes to start in the first half of 2017; and expects the renovation to take about 8 months. He polled the residents for their thoughts on putting a cafe in the ground floor unit with the wrap around porch; several voiced concern over parking and changing the residential nature of the neighborhood.

Update on MECU's Neighborhood Event Grant by Graham Coreil-Allen, ATA's Social Media Specialist: Application was submitted for \$1000 to host a Back to School Festival on Saturday August 19, 2017. Residents volunteered to be on the Committee once we are approved. “Special Thanks” to Graham for writing the grant and for updating our website and FaceBook page.



Online Application Now Open for Baltimore City's 2017 YouthWorks Summer Jobs

YouthWorks is also recruiting organizations to serve as worksites and employers to participate in Hire One Youth

Baltimore, Maryland (January 3, 2017) – Today, Baltimore City residents between the ages of 14 and 21 can begin the 2017 YouthWorks summer jobs registration process by applying online at <http://youthworks.oedworks.com>.

Each year, YouthWorks matches thousands of city youth to summer jobs with for profit businesses, nonprofits and government employers throughout the region. They develop workplace skills, learn how to meet employers' expectations, gain exposure to career opportunities in high growth industries, and feel the pride of earning a paycheck. YouthWorks summer jobs will operate two, five-week sessions, the first beginning June 26 and the second on July 10.

"YouthWorks has proven to be a very popular and successful summer employment program," Mayor's Office of Employment Development Director Jason Perkins-Cohen said. "Baltimore's young people are eager to work, and I encourage them to apply online to better their chances at a getting summer job."

Youth Registration

The online application is the first step of the YouthWorks summer jobs registration and will remain available for Baltimore City residents through Friday, March 10, 2017. Everyone who applies will be required to attend an in-person certification appointment in order to be eligible for a YouthWorks job. These certification appointments will be conducted after school and on Saturdays from late January through March. There is a limit to the number of YouthWorks summer jobs. Applying online and attending an in-person certification appointment do not guarantee an offer for a YouthWorks summer job.

Worksite Registration

YouthWorks partners with a variety of organizations throughout the Baltimore City area that serve as summer worksites. Eligible worksites are not responsible for providing the funding to pay YouthWorks participants' wages, but they are required to provide close supervision and mentoring to ensure workers' full engagement throughout the program. Youth are scheduled to work five hours each day (excluding lunch), five days a week, for five weeks.

Organizations can visit youthworks.oedworks.com to read about worksite eligibility requirements and to apply to become a 2017 YouthWorks worksite.

Hire One Youth

YouthWorks' Hire One Youth strategy provides an opportunity for Baltimore's private-sector employers to help shape the future workforce by interviewing and hiring at least one responsible and motivated 16- to 21-year-old. These job-ready young people are to work a minimum of 120 hours during the summer at minimum wage or higher. Companies often choose to retain these employees past the summer in part- or full-time year-round employment. Corporate sponsors, philanthropic organizations and individuals can support YouthWorks by making a tax-deductible donation. It costs \$1,500 to fund one youth in a summer job, but contributions of any amount are appreciated. Online donations can be made at baltimorecityfoundation.org.

In fiscal year 2016 MOED served more than 20,000 residents at our career center locations, connected more than 1,200 people with computer literacy training at our digital learning labs, assisted more than 1,000 businesses with developing and retaining their quality workforce, and placed more than 3,100 individuals in jobs at an average wage of nearly \$12/hour. The YouthWorks summer jobs program offered 8,000 young people employment in 2016 at more than 900 worksite locations.


