

ATA's monthly meeting was held at Parks & People Foundation – The Stone House on Thursday May 9, 2019. Community member **Donna Cypress** opened the meeting, and led constituents in The Lord's Prayer. The minutes from the April 11th meeting were read by secretary, **Anne Goncalves**, and approved as read.

President, Barbara Anderson Dandy welcomed residents and our partners WDPD, Healthy Neighborhoods and Maryland Volunteers Lawyers Service.

Agenda:

Officers from the Western District Police Department Community Collaboration Unit spoke with residents and welcomed comments and concerns.

John Kern, from Maryland Volunteers Lawyers Service spoke to residents about wills, estate planning, and power of attorney. MVLS is a non profit organization that works to connect people who are unable to afford an attorney with one willing to do pro-bono work. Estate Planning is one of the areas they focus on – they recommend using their services to complete three important documents: advanced healthcare directive/living will, financial power of attorney, and a will - if a citizen does not have these documents, the state of Maryland will decide when it comes time. Mr. Kern also discussed MVLS's campaign about the importance of having your name on the deed to your home. He encouraged residents to visit myhomemydeed.com and made brochures available. Jenny Hope, new Program Director of Healthy Neighborhoods and **Vernice Turner**, GMCC's Healthy Neighborhoods Coordinator, spoke to residents about available benefits through Healthy Neighborhoods: home improvement loans, purchase loans, and refinance loans. Graham Coreil -Allen, interim vice president and OSI community fellow, spoke to residents about his work in transportation advocacy for the neighborhoods surrounding Druid Hill Park. In his effort to make resident's opinions heard during the upcoming DOT planning period, Graham's project TAP Druid Hill Park will be having two information collecting pedestrian safety walks: the walk for southern blocks will be held Saturday, June 29th 2-4 pm, and the walk through northern blocks will be Saturday, July 27th 2-4 PM.

Monalisa Diallo introduced herself as the new community liaison for Senator Antonio Hayes' office, in attendance to hear any questions, concerns, or comments. Miss Diallo handed out Senator Hayes' 2019 Legislative Session End of Session Letter.

SALUTE TO COMMUNITY PRINCIPAL ZULMA MOORE



Principal Moore wins BCPS' Heart of the School Award.

The Baer School's Principal Zulema Moore won the Heart of the School Award Monday night, and dedicated her award to her own heart: the Baer students and their families.

"To all of my Baer scholars you have survived incredible odds. You have been diagnosed by some of the nation's experts, with all they believe you cannot do," she told the audience in the Hippodrome. "When meeting with a first-time Baer parent sometimes you can see the stress in their eyes, and the fear. They start off telling me all about what the doctors say and what the diagnosis is and what they can't do. And I get the blessing of being able to turn the conversation around. I say: tell me what makes them smile. Tell me all about their personality. I can read their paperwork. Tell me about your baby. Tell me what I can do so you're not worried when you're at work. Tell me what I can do to make them comfortable. Tell me how I can serve you and your family."

Principal Moore was introduced, via video, by Baer student Taylor Diggs and featured in a short video introduction to the school and its mission: therapeutic and educational excellence.

"It's the best part of what Baer does. We help our families dream," Moore told attendees. "Day by day. Step by step. Skill by skill. Those dreams become little Baer miracles. Every single day." Congratulations from the Greater Mondawmin Community.

FAREWELL TO DR. MARIE THOMPSON



The Greater Mondawmin Community and Coordinating Council would like to wish a farewell to Dr. Maria Thompson, 7th and first female president of Coppin State University. Dr. Thompson announced that she would step down at the end of the academic year.

New to Maryland, President Thompson held a number of meet and greet events and listening sessions, both on and off-campus early. The consensus; Coppin State is a jewel of a campus, deeply loved by its students and alumni for its academic prowess, as well as its family-like feel. In addition to the connections that students made with faculty and staff, many lauded the picturesque campus, leadership opportunities, and ease of access to campus.

President Thompson spent three years building on the established legacy, which took the university deeper into a technological dive with data democratization.

What was key in her leadership was access to and use of data was not limited to college deans and select administrators. Dr. Thompson requested the development of a platform that allowed the entire campus access to data that would help support student success and college completion to graduation.

What she leaves behind is a campus that is grateful for the leadership that allowed every faculty, staff, and administrator an opportunity to play a supporting role in those graduating students success.

President Maria Thompson's last day is June 30, 2019. After which she will reside in her hometown of Nashville, Tenn.


